# Covid19 Update

- There are no active advisories.
- Reviewed classroom closures throughout the Board.
- Rapid Antigen tests will be sent home with students before the break.
- When students and staff return in the New Year onsite proof of the screening will be required.
- In the New Year all assemblies will be virtual only and parent/teacher interviews will also be virtual.

Special Education Lead Update -Nerina Facca Schools are encouraged to submit referrals to the school board ABA Leads for all students diagnosed with ASD, regardless of identification through the IPRC process. It is recommended all students with ASD are referred to the Ontario Autism Program to support access to available resources for students with ASD. Through this program, children receive services and support until the age of 18. Firefly is the community service provider in our region who provide ASD supports. An overview of Firefly's services, obtained from their website, was reviewed.

Within our board there are two ABA Leaders who provide consultation to school teams to support the implementation of ABA methods for students with ASD. We do not have any students waiting for service.

Since March of 2021 we have partnered with George Jeffery Children's Service to provide virtual social skills programs. Through this partnership this fall we offered Conversation Cues for 2 groups ages 6 to 9 years and 10-17 years. There are currently 12 students partaking in these programs. Beginning in January we are offering Zones of Regulations for 3 groups ages 5 to 7 years, 8 to 13 years, and 14 to 17 years.

### Response to Question More information George Jeffery Children's Service

#### **Zones of Regulation:**

Zones of Regulation® programs delivered virtually (through Zoom) by George Jeffrey Children's Centre for our **students with the diagnoses of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD)** beginning the week of January 10, 2022. These programs will be run for groups aged 5 – 7 years old, 8 – 13 years old and aged 14 – 17 years old. Attached you will find a flyer with a detailed description of the programs.

Social skills program Conversation Cues – Model Me Kids® delivered virtually (through Zoom) by George Jeffrey Children's Centre for our students with the diagnoses of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) beginning the week of October 11, 2021. This program will be run for a group aged 6-9 years old and for a group aged 10-17 years old.

### **Education and Community Partnership Programs**

Schools who have student who they feel meet the criteria and would be a good fit, are having conversations with Special Education Leaders.

#### **IPRCs**

Some schools have started IPRCs. Schools are continuing to reach out and schedule these over the course of the year.

#### **SEA Claims**

Schools continue to be submit over the course or the year for students who will benefit from computer equipment and have received recommendations for assistive technology. Recommendations must come from a qualified professional such as a Speech-Language Pathologist, Psychologist or Occupational Therapist.

SEA claims also continue to be inputted for students who have recommendations and may benefit from other equipment (Claim's based) from an Occupational Therapist, Physiotherapist, or other and meet requirements.

Without applying pro-rated Tuition Fees and Tax Revenue to Special Education expenses, we are 24.7% underfunded. However if we allocate other pro-rated revenue streams to Special Education we are 2.4% underfunded.

# FUNDING THROUGH GSN'S FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION BUDGET ALLOCATIONS

# **Pupil Foundation Grant**

- Classroom Teachers
- Education Assistants
- Professionals who provide support for special education such as speech pathologists are funded through a combination of the Pupil Foundation Grant, the Special Education Grant, and other supplemental grants.

# **Supplemental Grants**

# **Special Education Grant**

This grant may only be used for special education. There are 6 allocations:

- Special Education Per Pupil amount (SEPPA); based on total enrolment
- Differentiated Special Education Needs amount (DSENA) includes Northern Adjustment (formerly Northern Supports Initiative or NSI) to fund regional collaboration for northern boards. Also includes funding for a multi-disciplinary team to build capacity, support special education assessments and help teachers and EA's better understand and adapt to the unique student needs (up to 4 FTE's)
- Special Equipment amount (SEA)
- Special Incidence Portion (SIP)
- Education & Community Partnership Program (ECPP) (formerly Care Treatment, Custody & Correctional amount)
- Behaviour Expertise amount (BEA) ABA (applied behavior analysis) professionals

# Support for Students Fund

Supports for Students Fund (SSF) provides flexible funding for school boards to support the learning needs of students, which may include special education and mental health and wellbeing. We currently have 3 Education Assistants that are funded through this grant.
