Keewatin Public School Environmental Partnership:

Can Learning Be an Adventure

During the fall of 2014, Keewatin Public School staff and Keewatin Public School Council, inspired by the great outdoors embarked on a collaborative mission to develop the True North Adventure Program. In the planning process, staff collaborated on developing the Vision, Mission, Values and Method for program delivery and brainstormed learning activities and recreational opportunities that would make up the program. Keewatin staff strongly felt that an environmental focus would be a natural "fit" for the school to assist teachers in meeting curriculum expectations, to better engage children in their learning and to provide a fun, safe and active learning environment. Details of the program follow.

True North Adventure Program

Vision: Keewatin Public School students will become environmentally active and responsible citizens.

Mission: Our Mission is to ignite a life- long love of learning through practical hands-on experiences in the natural environment.

Values: To understand, respect and interconnect with the natural world by doing one's best and nurturing character through:

- Developing courage to try new experiences
- Demonstrating kindness to others
- Developing student leadership
- Developing independence
- Building students' self-confidence & self- esteem
- Nurturing students' love for the outdoors and experience all that nature has to offer
- Developing friendships, teamwork and cooperation
- · Becoming environmental stewards
- promoting academic achievement

Program Implementation

The True North Adventure Program is in its second year of implementation and has been well received by students, parents and staff. Highly skilled and dedicated staff and volunteers provide a variety of activities for children from Kindergarten age to Grade 6. Learning opportunities and recreational activities are multi-faceted, meet Ontario curriculum expectations and include the following components to date;

Mink Bay Trail system: nestled in the forest behind the school, the Mink Bay Trail and surrounding area contains several ecosystems and unique geological features including

Respectfully submitted by: Heather Mutch Principal, Keewatin Public School wetlands, streams and Darlington Bay making this an ideal setting for exploring, environmental studies and teambuilding games such as Capture the Flag.

1st Keewatin Cub Scouts: for 8, 9 and 10 year-old boys and girls. Meetings held once per week at lunch time. Cubs earn badges, participate in the Cub Scout program, do community service work in the community and engage in three overnight camps per year during the fall, winter and spring to learn survival and camping skills.

Boreal Forest School & Outdoor Classroom: last spring Keewatin Public partnered with Garden Hill Montessori – Boreal Forest School to collaborate in creating an outdoor space for Kindergarten children. Students in Full Day Kindergarten and Transitions North classrooms explored the natural forested area behind Keewatin Public School connecting with nature through inquiry-based learning. A big focus of the approach is to "trust the children and give them space to have great ideas". The motto, "there is no bad weather, there is only bad gear' guides us as children visit the forest in cold and hot weather, rain, snow and mud. The huge success of this experience provides the impetus to continue taking Kindergarten students "out into the forest" and expand the experience to all grade levels.

Mink Bay Plant Guide & Mink Bay Birdhouse Project-based learning: In 2015-16, the Grade 5/6 class built a variety of nesting boxes and installed them around the Mink Bay Trail behind the school. Over the year, the students regularly observed the variety of birds making their homes. The class is working on a Mink Bay Plant Guide, collecting and recording plant species and compiling descriptions and drawings.

Field Trips & Outers: Every year, Grade 5/6 students attend Outers at B'ni B'rith Camp on Town Island, Lake of the Woods and participate in recreational programming including swimming, sailing, kayaking, canoeing, rock climbing, archery and orienteering. This past June the class visited the Environmental Lakes (ELA) and learned about aquatic ecosystems and the impact of water quality on fish populations.

Community Projects & Fundraisers: Students develop civic-pride and learn how to give back to the community by raising funds for a variety of charities including "It's a Dog's Life", the Cat Shelter and Jump Rope for Heart to name a few.

Other activities and projects: school vegetable garden, butterfly project, swimming lessons for all children JK – Grade 6, Primary & Junior Hockey Academy, Cross Country Skiing & Snowshoeing, Sliding & Skating

<u>Future Endeavors:</u> Teacher Learning Leadership Program (TLLP) Outdoor Learning Environment with rock wall, water source, amphitheater & Interpretive Trail (partnership with KPDSB, Keewatin School Council and City of Kenora) - \$34,000 grant approved

Mink Bay Trail Guide publication & Trailhead project – anticipated partnership with KP School Council, KPDSB, City of Kenora, community of Keewatin, Kenora Urban Trails Association and Kenora Lake of the Woods Regional Foundation.



Secondary Summer Learning 2016

Summer learning continues to grow, both in student numbers and earned credits. There were approximately 30 KPDSB teachers participating this past summer.

Students participating in summer programming are for example, completing credit recovery, taking additional courses to explore career options, completing e learning and other on-line opportunities and in some cases completing courses that do not fit into their regular day school schedules. In all cases, summer learning improves credit accumulation, can close gaps, help improve pathway choices and moves students them closer to their graduation goals.

Summer programs include cooperative education courses, credit recovery, dual credits in partnership with Confederation College, specialized literacy and numeracy programming and regular credit courses. Courses are delivered by KPDSB teachers in both regular and e formats and in the case of students who require specialized course offerings we use both with the Northern E learning Consortium or larger providers based in Southern Ontario.

Specific to First Nations students in Four Directions in Dryden, Kenora and Sioux Lookout, reach ahead credits are now an embedded part of program delivery to ensure that students attain 16+ credits by the end of grade 10, a significant research based milestone that is used to predict future graduation success. Students often begin these credits in the latter part of grade eight.

School teams in each community build programming and opportunities for students based on identified student need and the commitment of students and parents regarding participation over the summer months. When necessary, schools partner with each other to both build and deliver programming for students.

As we continue to work with our northern partners, we are building an enhanced cooperative education summer program that will be designed for First Nations students who return to their home communities and have local employment over the summer. We have completed some small pilot work to date and this will be available to all interested students beginning in the summer of 2017.

Child Care Program Planning Update 2016

The goal of the Ministry of Education is to move Child Care Programs and Ontario Early Years Child and Family Centres (OEYCFC) into schools to provide better services and programs for children and families.

"As child care, early learning and the education system become increasingly integrated, more children will benefit from a stronger start in life."

From 2012-2015, the Keewatin-Patricia District School Board (KPDSB) along with the Kenora District Services Board (KDSB) received \$749,800 in Schools-First Child Care Retrofit Funding from the Ministry of Education, to renovate school spaces for Child Care Programs and Outdoor Spaces to accommodate younger students. The following were the renovations undertaken.

| King George VI Public School | New Child Care Space/Outdoor Space |

The Ministry of Education has provided a process again for School Boards along with District Services Boards to submit a request for Capital Project Funding to provide Child Care Programs and OEYCFC in schools. As part of this second round of funding the KPDSB and the KDSB have submitted a plan in July of 2016 to the Ministry of Education to continue to add Child Care Programs and OEYCFC into our Elementary Schools.

Phase One-Dryden Area 2016-2017:

- Relocate all Child Care Programs from The Dryden Children's Resource Centre to New Prospect and Open Roads Public Schools. (August 2016)
 - Will relocate Preschool Program to Open Roads PS
 - Will relocate Toddler Program to New Prospect PS
- Relocate Best Start Hubs to New Prospect PS and Open Roads PS libraries on a rotating basis so families will have the opportunity to attend the programs in each school.
- Upgrade New Prospect PS and Open Roads PS Kitchens to support food services for the programs.

Phase Two-Sioux Lookout Area 2016-2018:

- Relocate the Child Care Programs from Norah Love Children's Centre in Sioux Lookout to Sioux Mountain Public School.
 - Will relocate the Toddler Program to Sioux Mountain PS
 - Will renovate a classroom space for the current Preschool Program
 - Will renovate a classroom space for the current OEYCFC

Phase Three-Kenora Area 2016-2018:

- Relocate the Child Care Programs from Cameron Bay Children's Centre to Evergreen Public School and Keewatin Public School.
 - Will relocate the Toddler Program to Evergreen PS
 - Will relocate the Preschool Program to Keewatin PS

As part of the 'Students Come First' Vision to support children in our board, it has been our goal to provide the best services for our families by providing Child Care Programs and OEYCFC in our schools.

Over the last five years the KDSB and the KPDSB have worked collaboratively and efficiently to enhance services for parents and children throughout the region. In the first round of Child Care Capital Retrofit Funding we were able to renovate indoor classroom spaces to accommodate 68 additional child care spaces, as well as renovate outdoor playground areas. In this second round of Child Care Capital Retrofit Funding we plan to expand these services to more schools and areas within the board to increase services for more families in the board.

Meno Ya Win Health Centre/KPDSB Partnership Report

BACKGROUND

In the spring of 2014, a partnership was created between the Keewatin Patricia District School Board, the Meno Ya Win Health Centre, and the Sioux Lookout First Nations Health Authority. The purpose of this partnership was to provide educational services to hospital clients and resulted in the creation of the Meno Ya Win K-12 Classroom and Adult Learning Center. We receive financial support from the Ministry of Education to assist us in this work.

This classroom, located within the Health Center, serves Meno Ya Win and the Sioux Lookout First Nations Health Authority adult clients and their children staying in the Jeremiah McKay Kabayshewekamik Hostel. Tikinagan Child and Family Services clients, and First Step Women's shelter clients are also served here.

STUDENT SUPPORT and STAFFING

K-8 students are supported at their Grade level through literacy and numeracy assessments by teacher, Sara Cosco. Some of these students are receiving treatment in hospital and some are accompanying adults receiving treatment. Students receive customized, age level appropriate programming for the duration of their attendance. Assessment and student growth information is then shared with the home school or education authority when these children return home.

Both secondary school and adult learners are supported in their current studies, through an educational pathway to pursue an Ontario Secondary School Diploma. Some adults are upgrading past coursework to meet requirements for post-secondary education. Instruction is provided by an Adult and Continuing Education Teacher.

Students are welcome to attend the classroom for any length of time, from partial days to the extent of their stay in Sioux Lookout.

2015-16 PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT AND STATISTICS

There were continued increases in enrollment in 2015-16. The increases in enrollment and program development were due to continued and strengthened partnerships between KPDSB and Meno Ya Win and various other supporting agencies and the large numbers of people receiving care and services through the Health Center.

The classroom continues to offer various cultural learnings and new programing opportunities for classroom students and their families. In addition to regular instruction, students can access

- Traditional Drumming and Teachings (Elder Ralph Johnson)
- Traditional Teaching/ Student Counselling Support (Tom Chisel, SLFNHA Counsellor and Elder)
- Counselling Support (Community Health and Addictions)
- Fitness/DPA (Physiotherapy/Rehab Department)
- Nutrition Programming

The student population enrolled in the secondary and adult part of the program comes from 25 different northern communities. All 90 participants this past year, voluntarily self-identified as First Nation, Metis, or Inuit. This portion of the program grew from 72 students in 2014-15. Student numbers in the K-8 program fluctuate due to family circumstances at any given time. This past year, 63 elementary students were served. The classroom also served 11 adult students while they were residents of the First Step Women's Shelter.

There were 20 secondary learners enrolled, 10 of who are clients or wards of Tikinagan CFS. In 2015-16 we have successfully transitioned 7 secondary aged students to full time students at Queen Elizabeth District High School.

PLANNING AHEAD

We are continually looking for ways to improve outcomes for these learners. Their challenges include the overwhelming priorities and concerns outside of their educational goals. These concerns, of course, are foremost on personal health, family health and home and family that are left behind in their communities. Working and focusing on education can be therapeutic for many during their stay. We will continue to work with additional partners and integrate curriculum into care plans.

When students leave the hospital, we have them continue their educational work at home. We will continue to utilize 21st Century learning to assist the students once they have left the classroom. Instruction utilizes phone, email, Google Docs, Facebook, and Skype to assist students in the successful completion of coursework.

At this point, we are very pleased with the program and its uniqueness in helping serve and support students in the region and anticipate continuing to grow this unique work.


